Henry Budd College for Ministry recognizes these challenges and has created a fund to provide bursaries for Indigenous students with the support of the Anglican Foundation.

In recognition of new realities, VST has created a Contemporary Anglican Formation Program with the support of AFC grants. This innovative approach to learning features a weekend residential teaching retreat model with spiritual direction, pastoral care, and communal practices. Students preparing for ordained ministry are developing a meaningful sense of the ethos and culture of the Anglican Communion through this successful program.

Queen's College is now taking training for ministry courses into remote parts of the province with the help of AFC. "This project is all about innovation," says Provost Dr. Rick Singleton. The Diploma in Theology and Ministry program has been redesigned to provide local training at sites across the province. Highlighted are four pillars of ministry: good theological education, pastoral practice, spiritual development, and faith-based community learning.



MOOSONEE SCHOOL FOR MINISTRY

Recognizing a clear need for a different form of ministry training, the Moosonee School for Ministry was created for First Nations and non-aboriginal students to attend modules of study over the course of several weekends. Parish field work is undertaken between modules. AFC provided funding for students whose travel costs were prohibitive. With the vast distances covered by the diocese, these modules make training for the diaconate and priesthood possible.
