- Huron University College, London, ON



## REPLACE THE ROOF AND SAFEGUARD THE AIR

Repairing the roof and ensuring indoor air quality might not inspire the pizzazz of ministry, but actually the environmental quality of a parish hall is exceedingly important! That's what the folks at St. John the Evangelist in downtown Kitchener believed when they embarked on a large-scale renovation of five roofs and the installation of a new HVAC system. Founded in 1856, St. John's has always been a vibrant presence in the downtown core. In addition to many forms of outreach and community care, the parish has a "green passion"—a mindful awareness of the earth and the environment. The roof over their heads and the air quality inside have proven to be remarkably important in their ongoing ministry. ✨



## COOKING WITH CARE

As the capital of the Northwest Territories, Yellowknife sits on the north shore of Great Slave Lake, south of the Arctic Circle. The landscape is rocky and rolling, and you can smell spruce and birch in the cold air in winter and the warm winds of summer. Holy Trinity Anglican Church is integral to the community with one hundred parish families, and it is a hub for local residents. Consecrated in 1950, the church was in need of a new kitchen that would be user friendly, modern, and functional to support the many groups that use it every day of the week. ✨



## THE BIBLE IN CREE

• Wycliffe Bible Translators and the Indigenous Spiritual Ministry of Mishamikoweesh, Kingfisher Lake, ON

Translating Scripture does more than help Cree people encounter God. Even people of Cree heritage who may not live in isolated communities and are fluent in English benefit from reading the Word of God in their mother tongue. Scripture becomes living and real in the languages of our communities. One Cree woman reported that reading Scripture materials in her own language made her feel "complete somehow." Three years of funding totalling \$30,000 is helping to make translation in five different Cree languages possible through the Wycliffe Bible Translators. ✨



## FOURTEEN-YEAR-OLD JAMES RECEIVES A NEW WHEELCHAIR!
